Recent Events

Much has happened since the November choir newsletter! Never before has the choir been so busy. A number of special events stand out:-

* Wednesday November 26th - The men's section of the choir sang at the American Embassy's Thanksgiving Day Service at St. Bartholomews in the presence of the Ambassador, Mrs. Jean Kennedy Smith.

* Sunday December 7th - We had a full church for our Concert of Carols and Festive Readings as a result of which over £1300 was raised for church funds and over £400 was donated to the Samaritans. Alan Stanford once again captured the Christmas spirit in his selected readings and we are very much in his debt.

* Saturday December 13th - The boys performed again this year in the Culwick Choral Society's Christmas Concert in the National Concert Hall. Malcolm Wisener is of course the Chorus Master of the Culwick. At this concert he really needed "Roller Skates" as he flitted from the organ, to accompanying Bryan Hoey on the piano;

to conducting the boys.

Sunday December 14th, Monday * December 22nd, Tuesday December 23rd -The three Raymond Gubbay concerts gave the boys the exciting opportunity to sing in front of capacity audiences. The Waterfront Hall, Belfast was quite an adventure and the choir joined with the Orchestra of St. Cecilia, Carlow Choral Society, Philip Simms (Conductor), Crispin Steel-Perkins (Trumpet), and Peter Evans (Tenor). The boys received an especially warm welcome from an audience of over 2,000 people. The performances in the National Concert Hall were identical apart from two changes of artists - Richard Cooke (Conductor) and Arthur Davies (Tenor). The fees earned will be going towards the costs of our Paris trip. Special thanks must go to Scanveco/Saab Cars for paying for the coach to and from Belfast.

* Friday December 19th - The full choir gave a concert in the Hugh Lane Gallery for "their friends". This was a lovely building to sing in and the concert was extremely well received.

CD Recording Progress

Two out of our three CD Recording sessions have now taken place and progress is going well. We have had some very intense practices over the last few weeks but the final CD should make all the effort well worth it. It is fair to say that none of us realised exactly how much hard work was involved in the production of a CD. There is also a problem with the odd door creaking or an airplane flying overhead which demands additional takes. With a little bit of luck the CD should hopefully be ready for release by May.

We may however be close on £3,000 short, which we will have to strive to make up by early summer concerts and other events. We have once again applied to the Cultural Committee of the Department of Foreign Affairs for a contribution. We have also contacted the French ambassador to see if he could help. We are hopeful that something may come out of this.

Bobby Barden or Malcolm Wisener if you can help us towards any of these costs.


Get Well Soon
