Organ Update

We never cease to marvel at the generosity of many, which has left us over twothirds of the way to the total of around £200,000 needed pay for our Organ Restoration.

We've gotten this far thanks to a few very large and very generous contributions - but the remaining £60-£70,000 will have to come from our worthy parishioners and friends.

Everyone warns that this sum will be the hardest to get in, so we appeal to all those who have not yet made a commitment to help.

At present all that can be seen in the church is the empty organ chamber - but be assured that work is progressing on schedule at Trevor Crowe's premises.

The organ chamber needs a new roof, not to mention general insulation all round, and this is currently in progress.

When the work is complete, probably in the beginning of the New Year, St. Bartholomew's Church will have one of the finest organs in Dublin, which will help to ensure that St. Bartholomew's high musical tradition is secure for the future.

Choir Trip Easter 2001

We must be the most travelled choir in Ireland. In the past ten years alone, the choir has visited Gloucester. Worcester. St. David's, Paris, Lichfield, Exeter, Hereford (twice), and Ripon, not to mention a catalogue of other catheand churches in drals Ireland.

With the huge task of funding the organ rebuild we have decided that a visit to a cathedral within Ireland makes better financial sense for this year.

The cost of taking the choir abroad is pretty substantial. We couldn't possibly expect parents to contribute even close to the full transport, accommodation, food, and outing costs.

We are very fortunate that our "Friends of the Choir" - including many former choristers - contribute generously to fund such trips. To make up the balance, we run a series of concerts and other fund raising events.

The adults always fully meet their own costs.

Two other choir boys who we often see back at St. Bartholomew's also appear in the photograph: Noel Houlden and George Reeves.


Get Well Soon
