With great support from parents and friends of the choir, almost £900 was raised for the choir fund.

It all happened when a small film production company based in Pembroke Road asked the Vicar if they could film part of a short play in the Church for a six to seven minute video for a forthcoming competition. St Columba's Day, 9th June, after Mass was the agreed date. And all duly arrived complete with props and support artists. They were left to it with the arrangement to lock the Church at 6pm. So far so good. They had run out of time and would return early

on Sunday to complete the Church shots but this time only outside.

The play is based on a bereavement leading into the formalities of the Funeral Rituals. A hiccup occurred when the hearse was late on Sunday morning. Instead of arriving at 10.15 it wound its way around Elgin Road at 11.05. Frantic gestures sped through the cast as all attempted to complete the filming before the Eucharist commenced. Many worshippers were inconvenienced on arrival trying to find their usual parking spot. Others were bewildered as to why a coffin should be spotted in the grounds on a Sunday.

Irregardless the Choir and Servers and Vicar lined up meeting as is the custom

at the Parish Room door. Vestry Prayer concluded the Vicar turned round. A coffin on trolley, complete with two pall bearers was parked at the West door. Choristers were amazed - what might this be - a newly introduced ceremony for **Trinity** Sunday? The Vicar was not amused. His face said it all. One look and the pall bearers sped swiftly out of sight. The Eucharist continued unhindered.

A sincere word of apology from the film crew for an greatly regretted episode. They thank all who showed such patience and tolerance whilst they attempted to gain lost time on a very tight schedule on a hopefully worthwhile project.

Post-Easter Visit to Cork - April 19th - 22nd
