

Farewell to Martin Hilliard

It is rightly a source of pride for a parish when a vocation arises in its ranks. On Sunday June 8th we bade farewell to Martin Hilliard and his wife Marlyn, who have been parishioners for nearly thirty years. They migrated to us when John Neill was incumbent, and they and their three children — Elizabeth, Robert and Jane, all of whom grew up in the parish — have been prominent in our midst, not least in the musical sphere. The binding of the choir's sheet music was one of Martin's initiatives, and the blue and red folders that we see testify to his own deft work with needle and thread, and to his talents as a teacher of other amateur bookbinders. Martin was also for many years a member of the Vestry, and for some of them its secretary. He well knows the councils of the Church from the perspective of a layman. Of the latter species he was an impeccable exemplar: a man full of gentle common sense, but not averse to hastening matters to a needful conclusion.

Martin's was a late vocation, embraced after a long career spent teaching mathematics at the High School.

At a time when he might reasonably have contemplated retirement, he has embarked on a second career. The Divinity Hostel is behind him,



and Larne stands ready to welcome him as a curate.

Martin will be a good parson. He is a level-headed fellow, but not too solemn. Think of his characteristic laugh: tell him something that is funny, allow perhaps for a slightly delayed reaction, and be rewarded with a rippling mirthful explosion.

We shall miss Martin and Marlyn, but we can have no doubt that a force for good is at work in the course he is following. We shall wish him well in the seventh decade of his life as he embarks on his second career; and we will equally look forward to his return to us, in due course, upon his second retirement.

Martin Hilliard has been a regular worshipper in St. Bartholomew's since about 1979. His long association with St Bartholomew's comes to a formal end when he is ordained Deacon to serve in the parish of Larne with Rev. Stephen Ford, although we hope that he can fit in an occasional visit with us in the future. Martin contributed in many ways to life in St. Bartholomew's. He was for many years a member

of the Select Vestry, some of them in the capacity of Hon. Secretary. His contributions at vestry meetings were always succinct and relevant. He devoted significant time and energy to organising and binding the music used by our choir. And we must not forget his expertise at making mulled wine for our parish celebrations! Following thirty five years as a teacher, his three years in the Church of Ireland Training College, and now his advance into ministry brings a whole new meaning to the phrase 'career change'.

Choir Year In Review

Despite the uncertainties which beset the parish in the Autumn of 2007, the choirs have thrown themselves into an assortment of activities this past academic year, making the very best of the less-than-ideal circumstances in which they found themselves.

Although the main task of the choirs is to provide music for the services at St Bartholomew's, much more has gone on besides. Since September 2007, the boys and gentlemen have sung on an RTÉ television broadcast, travelled to sing at Carnew and at Westport, sung at two concerts in Dublin as well as singing at nearly forty services in St Bartholomew's (I tried to count up the number of rehearsals they have attended in this time, but got lost...).

Not to be left out, the girls have sung at Choral Evensong once each month as well as singing Evensong in Christ Church Cathedral (the first time that anyone can remember a choir from St Bartholomew's singing there), and representing St Bartholomew's at the annual RSCM festival service in the chapel of Trinity College. Back at St Bartholomew's, the girls also sang at the Easter Vigil and at Corpus Christi, as



well as joining together with the boys and the gentlemen for the first time in singing at the annual Alan Stanford concert during the week before Christmas.

It hasn't been all hard work either, with bowling trips and outings to Funderland for both boys and girls. To cap it all, four of the senior boys recently achieved some of the highest marks in the country in their RSCM Voice for Life Bronze Medal Award examinations – an amazing achievement.

Considering our more limited resources this year, an awful lot has been achieved due to hard work and dedication on everyone's behalf. Special thanks are due to Eoghan Ward for his immense support of the musical life of the parish up until his departure at Christmas 2007, and to Alexandra Jobling for stepping so ably into the role of Organist in January 2008. We're all delighted that Alex will still be playing for us from time to time. Now that we are back to full strength, we look forward to new developments in the coming year. The future, as they say, might not be Orange, but it is certainly bright!


